Lorump, is unable to provide for and support himself, and therefore he makes this his application for admission into the

"SOLDIERS' HOME"; that he is a person of sobriety and good habits, and, if admitted as an inmate to said Home, he hereby agrees to abide by and obey all the rules and regulations made by the proper authorities of the Home for its government, and that he will perform all duties required of him, and obey all lawful orders of the officers of the said Home; and I sign this application with the full knowledge that any violation of the rules will subject me to punishment or dismissal, at the discretion of the Board of Visitors.
